There has been an increase in equipment and resources provided at lunchtimes to enable the children to be engaged active and focused. Pupil voice 'Playtimes and lunchtimes are great fun, as we have a lot of resources / stations of equipment that we can play with. There are resources that we can play with individually or we can work together with others to play. We all like being active outside and it helps us to be prepared to learn in the classroom in the afternoon' Pupil voice 'We love to go on the balance bikes and scooters at lunchtime, it is great to practice or balance and bike skills and now I have really good balance.' Outdoor learning enables the children the freedom, time and space to learn and demonstrate independence. Children gain awareness of the consequences of their actions on peers through team activities such as sharing tools and participating in play. Outdoor learning supports the development of physical stamina and gross and fine motor skills.	after school clubs.
